7:26 Meeting called to order - Ginger Myers

7:27 North East Region report - Ginny Rozenkranz

Ben asked for clarification on MACAA's role in the 2021 NACAA meeting in Philadelphia.

MACAA will assist for the 2021 conference along with the other states in the North East Region. Ginny discussed how they came to select Philadelphia for the 2021 bid. Some were concerned about the amount of time needed to host a national conference. After discussing with previous host sites, much of the work is in setting up events ahead of time, spreading out the workload. Nevin asked if everyone will need to be involved. As many people as can help would be great.

7:32 Achievement Award - awarded to Doris Behnke

Doris gave a presentation summarizing her work in Cecil County focusing on home horticulture. She shared highlights of working with MGs, 4-Hers, Watershed Stewards Academy, area schools, and others.

7:48 Mid-Career Award - awarded to Joe Fiola.

Joe gave a brief overview of his Small Fruit program in Maryland. He covered his work with viticulture, the growth of the MD wine industry, enology work and wine appreciation along with his international work. His parting advise was to work hard but also to take time to spend with family.

8:07 Distinguished Service Award - awarded to Shannon Dill

Talked about the highlights of her 16 years with Extension including some of the programs she has worked on such as Winning the Game, Annie's Project and others. She wants her kids to be able to enjoy the things she did as a child. That is why she does what she does.

8:10 Secretary's Report – Jessie Flores – gave members a chance to review the 2016 meeting minutes

Ben Beale made a correction at bottom of page 8 on Herb Reeds term as MACAA President. Dave Myers moved to approve minutes with Ben's revision. Dale Johnson seconded. All were in favor. Motion carried.

8:14 Financial report - Dale Johnson reviewed the printed Financial Report.

Dave directed attention to the report in the meeting brochure. Dave Martin recommended that Jim Lewis and Dale Johnson become committee chairs. Dale discussed that changes to the account would require a lot of additional paperwork. Dave Martin mentioned that there would need to be a motion in order to add Jim Lewis to have check writing privileges. The main things covered were award recipients travel to NACAA and in the past some support of JCEP.

10:22 Thoughts on Visiting Other States – Craig Williams from PA.

Shared thoughts on visiting other states. In smaller states the unfilled committee positions responsibilities fall back on the state President. He encouraged everyone to be involved in the input for the Foundation. On behalf of the PA group, he thanked MACAA for inviting to meeting.

10:24 State of Extension remarks - Dr. Tom Porter

UME is in great shape. UME survived 1/3 budget cut in 2008/2009. Weathered the storm better than many states. More than 90% of budget goes to operating costs, salaries, etc. Less than 10% toward administration – that is impressive. Hiring at a phenomenal pace. Filled more than 30 faculty position in past 2 years. He thanked State Hiring Committee.

Formalized professional track faculty promotion process.

Extension Plan of Organization – Important step to shared governance. Jackie asked about the portion of the Extension Plan of Organization (EPO) that did not pass vote. Dr. Porter mentioned that it needs to be addressed by the faculty and staff committee.

Online teaching effectiveness system – Tailored to reflect campus standards. Jenny R. mentioned that she has used business cards printed with QR codes (from Jon Moyle).

Signature Programs – direct result of Strategic Plan Implementation Team – next call coming up in August. Great way to recognize program.

UME Program Summit – Dr. Porter thought it was a great way to share the work of Extension with colleagues and to network

Integrated grant program - 18 applications and 4 proposals approved for funding. Stated that it would be good to have another seed grant program just for Extension.

Facilities – Repair and upgrades in county offices – average of \$15,000 per office. Wants to help improve facilities to improve effectiveness of offices. Computers – all machines 5 years or older to be replaced. Flat screen monitors – one for each office.

Professional Development – Funds to all tenure and professional track and also to administrative staff. Intended to support travel to PD opportunity including national conference, national meeting within 18 month period. Most of the above funds are coming from salary savings. The total is about \$500,000.

Administration – All the programs are doing well, but turn over in leadership has been a challenge. He would like to see leaders be in their position for at least 5 years for stability. We need to improve succession planning. Need more leadership raised up within organization (LEAD Maryland, etc).

Extension Internships – Committee established for undergrad Extension internship program. There is a need for employment opportunities and undergrads to understand what Extension is/does. Hopes to have this available in 2018. He would like to fund 10 interns.

State Extension Advisory Board – hopes to have first meeting this November

MACAA FOUNDATION FUND COMMITTEE REPORT June 2018

The purpose of the MACAA Foundation Fund Committee is to consider and recommend expenditures to the Foundation Fund Governing Board. The Foundation supports the professional improvement of its members and the improvement of the MACAA organization. In addition, the Foundation helps to create awareness by individuals and organization of the purpose of the NACAA Foundation Fund.

The Foundation is an account under the MACAA Federal Tax Identification number and is exempt from Federal income tax under section 501 (c), (6) of the Internal Revenue Code. Contributions to the account are not tax deductible.

Activity during the past year is shown on the following Balance Sheet and Income and Expense statements. AA and DSA awards were not issued in '15, '16, or '17; so they were paid in '17. At the beginning of the 2015 fiscal year, the corpus was invested in one Certificate of Deposit (CD) and the checking account. The interest earned on the "CD-30" is deposited directly into the Foundation's interest bearing checking account. As directed by a motion at the 2013 Annual Meeting, both the "CD-65" and "CD-increasing" investments were allowed to mature with the principal and interest transferred to the checking account to accrue a higher interest rate than was available with certificates of deposit. All accounts are held with PNC Bank.

The interest rates on the CD and checking account are very low and this is expected to continue through 2018. Please note that the present balance in the checking account reflects a reserve of interest income from past years as well as restricted corpus assets (equal to \$26,772.51) from the mature CDs, which were to be reinvested by the executive committee in 2016.

As of March 15, 2017, the Foundation had a total cash balance in the checking account of \$31,668.30 less the \$26,772.51 of restricted funds leaving an available balance of \$4895.79 in the checking account.

STEM education is an integral part of primary school curriculum. AgVenture allows Extension to teach 4th graders about the connection between STEM and agriculture through experiential learning practices. Extension Educators developed hands-on activities around animals, plant/environmental sciences, and nutrition, while linking station-specific activities back to STEM standards. Community partner-ships with local agricultural businesses and producers were created to support agriculture awareness to 4th grade students throughout the county. Pretests and posttests show a statistically significant change in STEM-related knowledge by students, while feedback from teachers demonstrates the educational value of the program. Through the evaluation students have shown an increase in basic agricultural knowledge gained taught through STEM practices. Because of these results, AgVenture has grown and now has a waiting list of interested schools. The success of the AgVenture program can be replicated in other Extension programs throughout Maryland and nationwide.

Many agents work with 4-H programs and are highly encouraged to submit those activities in this category.

AGRICULTURE AWARENESS DAY

Agriculture Organizations Come Together to Educate 7th Graders

Agriculture is an industry that is misunderstood by many residents. In 2016 a coalition of educators, researchers, agencies, and grassroots organizations was formed to educate students in Queen Anne's County. The importance of agriculture and its 235 career options was introduced to all students.



The partners created an "Agriculture Awareness Day" for all 7th graders across the county. The Board of Education and school principals were informed and were interested in education for their students about the importance of agriculture and the many career opportunities.

In a day-long structured program, the following agricultural topics were covered: technology, equipment, crops, aquaculture, nursery, produce, greenhouses, forestry, farm animals, bees, and numerous agriculture myths. There are four middle schools in Queen Anne's County with 700 students, making this a two day event.

The partners believe that 7th graders are the perfect age to learn about Maryland's number one industry and numerous career options. The 7th graders were excited to be out of the classroom and complete hands-on structured lessons. This allows the students to understand agriculture's importance in feeding the world and the truths of the industry. Lastly, the students were educated about the 235 careers related to agriculture, which opened their eyes to the agriculture career pathway before high school. The awareness day may open the door for the students to join 4-H and FFA, which will encourage them to join other agriculture organizations after graduation.

As our county is transforming to a more urban population, our goal is to provide a venue to develop agriculture literate citizens. Each of our partners has their own diverse expertise and by joining together we can accomplish this goal. With this accomplishment, Agriculture Awareness Day will become an annual event.

ANIMAL SCIENCE

Susan Schoenian and Jeff Semler participated in the NACAA pre-conference Animal Science Tour. There were 36 participants from 18 states. The tour kicked off on the evening of July 6th with an introduction to agriculture in the West by Jay Olsen of Snow College.

The first day we visited Monroe Mountain Aspen Restoration Project in the Fishlake National Forest. The discussion centered on public land ranching, grazing infrastructure, ecosystem management. The day ended at Johnson Mountain Ranch in Salina Canyon. It provided beautiful vistas for our dinner. The Johnson family shared their ranch history and how public and private lands dovetail into the management of their cattle operation and alternative enterprises.

Day two began at Fullmer Dairy and Registered Angus Operation. It is a 2,500 head dairy, milking 3X daily in a rotary milking parlor and Registered Angus Seedstock program. The family also discussed how important irrigation is to their crop production.

The next stop was Producers Livestock Market. They sell an average of 2,000 head of cattle weekly. They sell sheep twice monthly and they still sort on horseback. The final stop was the African Refugee Goat Project Farm. The project began with 25 does and now has grown to over 325 head of Boer goats with a few Nubians. The project provides a food source to Eastern African refugees, a few 4-H projects and is maintained by volunteers.

Susan and I would highly recommend participating in a pre-conference tour.

HORTICULTURE AND TURFGRASS

2017-2018 Maryland Department of Agriculture and University of Maryland collaborated to continue create teaching points and power point programs for Professional Fertilizer Applicators certification and Re-Certification. There are now over 1,400 certified Professional Fertilizer Applicators in Maryland who receive re-certification credits each year, often in conjunction with Commercial Pesticide Recertification through the University of Maryland Extension. UME offers 5 Commercial Pesticide Applicator Pesticide Re-Certification Conferences that provide credits for Forestry, Ornamental Plants (exterior and interior), Turf, Aquatics, Right of Way & Demonstration and Research for the state of Maryland.

The Maryland Nursery, Landscape and Greenhouse Association and University of Maryland Extension continue to collaborate to bring more horticultural conferences available to the Maryland Green Industry. The very successful educational conference created by Maryland Extension Educators and Specialists include Chesapeake Green, A Horticulture Symposium, The Cut Flower Short Course and Summer Tour, the Greenhouse Short Course, the Alternative Crops Course, Storm Water Management Conference, and the MNLGA Field Day.

SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE

At the MACAA meeting on June 22, 2017, Jim Brewer (NRCS) demonstrated the use of the MD Soil Health Card, a tool for quick in-field evaluation of a field's soil health. The tool serves as an excellent touch point for conversations about soil health between ag service providers and farmers, and, once trained, farmers can continue to use the tool for regular monitoring of changes resulting from management practice improvements. Development of a video demonstration of this tool is currently underway in partnership with Future Harvest CASA.

An online soil health self-evaluation tool is also underway. Instead of evaluating field conditions, this tool shows a farmer where they are on the continuum of soil health management, and points out areas for improvement. A pilot version of the tool is available at http://ter.ps/SHeval and is open to all. Final development of the tool is underway, targeting a full release in Fall 2018.

Nevin continues to lead the Building Soil Health project with a target audience of Ag Service Providers, funded by USDA Northeast Sustainable Agriculture Research & Education (NESARE). Upcoming activities include a series of field days that will include a section on best practices for effective adult learning, and a field trip to Rodale Institute in 2019.



On March 9, 2018, Jenny Rhodes and Nate Richards hosted an Organic Production meeting at Chesapeake College in Wye Mills with several additional MACAA members in attendance as participants and speakers.

As part of the June 21, 2018 AGNR In-Service, Nevin will present an update on the state and regional work of NESARE while also demonstrating and explaining story telling techniques that can be used in many teaching situations.

Nevin is a member of the steering committee for the Future Harvest Soil Health Summit planned for Nov. 1, 2018 at UMES in Princess Anne. In addition to several high-profile guest speakers, the program will likely include a special segment for Ag Service Providers on best practices for adult learning.
